

The St. Clare Fellowship in Seattle will celebrate the 800th Anniversary with their Roman Brothers and Sisters on October 2nd at St. James Cathedral, Seattle: with a 5-7 p.m. international food block party, 7:30 Vespers including a Mime group, slides of Assisi, children's choir, liturgical dance, dramatic reading from the Omnibus. There will be a social hour, followed at 10 p.m. by the Transitus.

THE ST. FRANCIS FUND

Br. Geoffrey, Minister General, sent word in a June 30th letter that "as a practical effort of our Society to help specific people in the Third World with whom we were in contact, a fund to which contributions would be invited, and which would bring speedy aid to such people. For some years, we have been helping individual tertiaries in Africa and Southeast Asia to enable them to survive and to educate their children. We have also helped a number of projects not connected with our Society - such as the Oxford Mission in Bangla-Desh and

a Roman Catholic community in South India, doing similar work to Mother Teresa but not so well known. I find as I visit Third World countries people who are really up against it - students who have real ability but no possibility of achieving their potential, some who are barely able to survive, let alone pay their school fees. I have also found tertiaries who want to help people in the Third World but they want to make sure their money goes to the people who need it and does not get swallowed up in the overheads of the assisting organisations, or fall into the wrong hands in the receiving countries. So often, the poor never see the aid which is being sent to them. ... If you have any contributions you wish to make or suggestions as to how it should be used, please send them to me.* We have not yet fully decided on the name of this fund. I have asked our Treasurer, Mr. Frank Chappell, to assist in the administration of this fund, which will be situated in England."

"This is to bring you the thanks of the Zimbabwean tertiaries for sending us your Chapter minutes. It is good to know that we are united with people so far away in the great family of St. Francis. I'm afraid we have no equivalent Provincial Minutes to send you. Our Province never meets as a whole. Quite apart from political difficulties between South Africa and the rest of us (I mean the countries, not the people in T.O.), travelling from one country to another really would be difficult and expensive. Our link is Br. Geoffrey who, in his yearly tour, goes from one country to another to be present at our national chapters. Of course it is a great joy to see him, but there are times when one would like to meet the others instead of just writing and hearing about them. ...

I was interested in reading your reports and to see how you are tackling the problem of communication and exploring ways of articulating what we are meant to be. It always helps to know that other people's problems are the same even if the details of the answers must be different in our very different situations.
